DRUMMING

a powerful therapeutic tool

Wendy Stapelberg, Director of Uzwelo Home attended a drumming facilitator course arranged and endorsed by the University of Stellenbosch in February 2019. Bevil Spence of Drum 360 not only introduced the theory of drumming to the students but also created opportunities to drum and have fun.

Drumming is defined as the rhythmic beating or tapping of a variety of percussion instruments. It is an extremely flexible activity which can be adapted for almost any situation or therapeutic goal. Uzwelo Home is planning on introducing drumming as part of the therapeutic programme.

Children who are involved in drumming learn to focus their attention and effort on one activity. This improves a children's abilities to concentrate and stay focused. Studies reveal that playing a percussion instrument strengthens skills in math and science.

Drumming teaches children about material science and the science of sound. Beginning as early as first grade, students have the ability to understand that every material (wood, metal and drum heads) have their own capacity or ability for vibration. Drumming teaches young students that sound occurs through vibration.

Overall brain development by stimulating the left and right sides of the brain simultaneously also occurs when drumming. Children have to use different parts of their brains to listen to the music around them, to instruct their bodies to move and create, and to understand a rhythm or to create their own. Playing music develops analytical processes on the left side of the brain and creativity in the right side of the brain. Increased networks between the left and right brain form thick fibers that interconnect the two brains. Drumming is not only beneficial to children's mental health and development, it's also great for helping children develop physical fitness.

Drumming increases heart rate and blood flow. Because of this, drumming teaches students about their bodies. The entire body is used while drumming, especially the fingers, hands, wrists, elbows, arms, shoulders and legs. Children also gain a better understanding of the rhythms of their own bodies. The heart has its own steady rhythm needed to keep the body functioning properly and breathing often involves that rhythm, too. While having fun children definitely benefit from this therapeutic activity.

WHY SAFE PARKS?

Children have a right to be children – to play and to dream. This is understood so universally that Article 31 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child requires all ratifying countries to;

"Recognize the right of the child to rest and leisure, Engage in play and recreational activities appropriate to the age of the child and ... Participate freely in cultural life and the arts".

But in South Africa, the HIV/AIDS epidemic has forced many children to take on adult responsibilities. They care for dying parents, look after younger siblings, learn to cook and clean. Play – so vital for healthy child development – is compromised as children become parents to younger siblings. The Safe Park concept seeks to remedy this reality for children by providing them with the time and the place to play – within the protective circle of trained child and youth care workers.

Safe Park provide safe, supervised places for orphans and vulnerable children to play and participate in a range of sporting, recreational and educational activities and to access psycho-social support services.

WHAT TYPE OF SAFE PARKS ARE AVAILABLE?

Safe Parks can be formal or informal.

A formal Safe Park operates from a designated, fenced site, usually with some outdoor play equipment and a container or building for indoor activities/ kitchen/bathrooms.

Informal safe parks operate in public spaces within a temporarily fenced off area which creates a space for children to feel psychologically safe.

WHO MAY ATTEND SAFE PARKS?

Safe Parks play an important role in orphans and vulnerable children's lives and has the potential to be a place of care, comfort, stimulation, learn and fun. The facilities and services offered at the Safe Park are available to all children from the community.

WHEN DO THE SAFE PARKS OPERATE?

Safe Park operating hours is as follow: (during school terms)

Monday – Friday: 14h30 -17h00 | Saturday: 12h00 -17h00 | Sunday: 12h00 -17h00

During school holiday: Every day from 9h30 – 17h00.

Where will you find uroc safe parks?

UROC safe parks operate in 12 rural villages. These communities are situated between 30 -70 km from the closest town, Piet Retief and Ermelo, Mpumalanga. Roads to the safe parks are dirt roads. Taxi services are limited.

WHAT IS BEING PLANNED FOR 2019?

A new site at Mdukuzane has been identified to be developed as a formal safe park. This area has been approved by the community committee and is central and accessible to the children of the community.

International and local funding is being sourced to make this dream come true.

You can become part of this dream. UROC requires the following fencing material:

8 x 3000 mm x 100mm fence posts | 14 x 3000 mm x 50 mm stays | 42 x 2400 STDY poles | 800 meters x 4 mm galvanized wire | 6 x 30m x 1800 x 100 x 75 x 25mm weld mesh | 21 x 15 x 500 mm Razor flat wrap | 5kg 2mm binding wire | 12 bags cement | 1x 900-1000mm personnel gate | 5lt Aluminium paint | 1.5 cub/m crusher dust

CARING COMMUNITIES PROTECT CHILDREN

The aim of child protection is to ensure the safety, well-being, care and protection of children. Uzwelo Home, UROC other NGO's and Department of Social Development have joined hands to promote the message of child protection.

- one voice against child violence, abuse and neglect -
- Physical abuse: Could be bruises, scars, fractures, burns bites,
- Sexual abuse: Sexually molesting or assaulting a child or allowing a child to be sexually molested or assaulted; encouraging, inducing or forcing a child to be used for sexual gratification of another person; participating or assisting in the commercial sexual exploitation of a child.
- Emotional abuse: It may take the form of failure to meet a child's need for affection, attention, stimulation, or constant verbal abuse, rejection, threats of violence or attempts to frighten the child.

• Deliberate neglect: Continuous failure to protect a child from exposure to any danger, cold, starvation, substance abuse, not carry out important aspects of care

What can YOU and I do?

- · Wear a green ribbon and wrap a tree with green material Teach children their rights
- Look out for each other's children and create a safe, secure and child friendly community
- Report child abuse to SAPS / social worker
- Pray for God's protection over our children

WHY GREEN RIBBONS?

It represents the hidden bruises and

scares carried by abused children for a lifetime BUT also carries with it hope for a future where there is no child abuse. Like a tree, it symbolizes life and growth associated with children. They need to be nurtured and conserved.
